I'd been playing 15-20 hours, not just two. Steve minimized my usage. "Play two hours then have an hour off," he would say. Gradually, my addiction began to wane. Now I'm actually playing again real football, not FIFA. I'm also back to college doing a Sports course and I feel a lot happier and hopeful.
